Herbert Muller

Recorded in the Book of Remembrance, now at Dover Museum, Herbert was 28 when he was reported missing on 1 May 1940.

An RAF Pilot Flying Officer, he had taken off from Newmarket for an evening raid on Stavanger, Norway.



The aircraft crashed into The Wash. Eventually the bodies of all six of the crew were recovered

Herbert is buried at Richmond, Surrey, where his mother was also laid in 1952.

The Admiral Harvey

HMS Glorious, an aircraft carrier, with two destroyers, HMS Acasta and HMS Ardent, was sunk in the Norwegian sea on 8 June 1940. Over 1,500 men were lost.

Amongst them were Edwin Wright, 21, and Charles Rogers of the Royal Navy. Charles was the only son of Frank and Elizabeth Rogers, licensees of the Admiral Harvey, Bridge Street.

Three months later, on 10 September, Mrs Rogers suffered a fractured arm during shelling, but her husband was badly injured and died next day in hospital.

The shell fell in almost exactly the same place as a Great War bomb, dropped by a Gotha on 22 August 1917. Lucy Wall, a servant at the pub, suffered severe injuries. She died on her way to hospital.

Mrs Rogers gave up the licence to Alfred and Flora

Harper, of the now-demolished pub "The Cause is Altered". On 26 November 1941, their only son, Cyril, serving with the Royal Tank Regiment, was killed in Egypt.



Accidents



Owing to war-time operations, some Dovorian service personnel died at home in The Summer of 1940.

Patrick Curran, Royal Artillery, was 21 when he was killed on 19 August whilst returning to his unit. Believing he was following a safe footpath in a restricted area, he trod on a mine.

The Coroner observed it was the second such death within a week. Two more occurred the next, when Lord North, Major in the Surrey and Sussex Yeomanry, and his sister Cynthia were killed by a landmine whilst on a Sunday stroll by the beach on 25 August. The family vault is at Waldershare church (left).



A road accident at Leighton Buzzard killed old Charlton schoolboy Leslie Taylor, RAMC, while Robert O'Connor, 25, RASC, died on 8 September during a surgical operation at Basingstoke. On the left is the headstone of Douglas King, Royal Engineers. He was buried in Liskeard, Cornwall, after his accidental death on 30 August.

TAYLOR.—In ever loving memory of our dear brother, Corpl. Frederick Leslie Hicks Taylor, who was killed in a road accident, October 7th, 4940.

Without farewell he fell asleep,
With only memories to keep;
Sleep on, dear brother, God know's best,
On earth, there's strife; in heaven, rest.
Sadly missed, but not forgotten.—From

At the opposite end of Britain, while his ship was undergoing repairs, Ordinary Seaman Sidney George Smith ("Chub"), 19, was drowned on 9 August. He is buried in Glasgow.

The Home Guard

John Holbrook, RA, died the night of 25/26 October in New Malden, London. He is buried there and commemorated on the screen wall

Edward ("Teddie") Chapman, The Buffs, was a keen cricketer and footballer, and member of the Dover Football Supporters Club. He had just gone back to London after a week's leave at home when he was killed at Olympia on 7 September. John Hughes, also of The Buffs, died too.

We Remember Too ...

Leonard Flisher – RAF. Died 12 May, aged 26

K9353 was shot down attacking the enemy and crashed at Sensenruth. John Horner, 24, and Leslie Davies, 21, also died

James Robertson (left) – Black Watch. Died 14 May, aged 26 Killed in action in France. He is buried in the Choloy War Cemetery, France

Edgar Watt - RAOC. Died 16 May

Died suddenly, and buried at Fowey, Cornwall

Charles Smith - Grenadier Guards, Died 19 May, aged 35

Killed in action in Belgium

Frederick Sweeting – RAC. Died 26 May, aged 30

He was reported missing, then as a POW and wounded. He died in a Belgian Military Hospital.

Geoffrey Onslow – Beds and Herts. Died 1 June, aged 28

Killed in action in Belgium



HMT Orford on loan as a troop carrier, was bombed off Marseilles

Lawrence Hunt – RAF. Died 2 June

He was reported as missing from operations over Germany, and later as having died.

John Myers – RAF. Died 11 June

During a communications mission over France. his Whitley was

probably hit by anti-aircraft fire. Leslie Keast, 25, David Braham, 25, James Black, 24, and Raymond Nuttall, 28, also died. .

John Smith – RE. Died 11 June, aged 30

He died at St Valery.

Robert Balfour - Black Watch. Died 11 June

He was reported missing, and over a year later as having died. He is remembered on the Dunkirk Memorial,

James Low – Black Watch. Died 12 June, aged 36

He is buried in the Veules-les-Roses Communal Cemetery, France

John Hogben – RN. Died 16 July, aged 20

His destroyer HMS Imogen collided with HMS Glasgow, and caught fire and sank near Duncasnby Head, Scotland

Frederick Geard – RN. Died 3 August, aged 24

HM Submarine Thames was sunk by an enemy mine.
